INVASIVE SPECIES TRAINING DAY ANNOUNCED

The Oconto County Lakes and Waterways Association (OCLAWA) has announced that the public is invited to attend an invasive species training and education seminar scheduled for Saturday, June 10. Scheduled are two events that day; the first session will be held from 9 a.m. to 11 a.m. at the White Potato Lake Sanitary District building at 13266 Walkers Bay Road in Pound, WI. The session will be repeated at 1 p.m. to 3 p.m. at the Lakewood Community Center, 17258 North Road, Lakewood, WI.

The events will be hosted by Paul Slawinski, UW-Extension Lakes CLMN Educator, along with Derek Thorn, FLOW AIS Coodinator. Attendees will learn to identify various aquatic invasive species along with strategies to help combat their spread.

The sessions are FREE and open to the public of Forest, Langlade, Marinette, and Oconto Counties.

Lakefront property owners across the country have growing concerns regarding the impact of wake boats on shorelines, weed beds, fisheries, and the lake's overall ecosystem. The popularity of wake boats has been increasing on many waterways. Wake boats employ the use of water as ballast to displace the boat hull deeper in the water thereby changing the size and shape of the wake. This higher wake allows wake boarders and wake surfers alike to "ride" or "surf" the wake. Although these boats travel more slowly through the water, the wake created by wake boats is higher and requires a longer distance to dissipate.

A 2022 study by the University of Minnesota indicated that wake boats require distances of greater than 500 feet from docks and shorelines to decrease the wake to levels similar to non-wake boats. Current Wisconsin boat regulations allow boaters to exceed no wake speeds 100 feet from the shoreline. Riparian property owners are reporting shoreline erosion as a result of higher waves created by wake boats.

Wake boats operating in shallow water disturb weed beds and stir up the bottom substrate. The boat's prop wash releases nutrients back into the water and can make toxic algae blooms more likely according to a study by the Lily Center for Lakes and Streams in Winona Lake, IN. Additional studies are underway regarding the impact the disruption of the weed beds have on fish populations.

Residents and visitors have enjoyed Crooked Lake for generations. Fishermen, water skiers, jet skiers, kayakers, sailors, and pontoon cruisers alike wish to protect this asset for generations to come. District property owners are welcome to share their concerns at the District's annual meeting scheduled for Saturday, May 27 at 9 a.m. at the Wally Remic Community Center in Crooked Lake.
